


THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF THE REDEEMER





Celebrant Blessed are you, O God, for the great day of salvation prepared from the beginning of the world, when Christ, though rejected on earth, will be seen by all to be chosen and precious in your sight. Through Christ you inspire in us the hope that earth's forces of darkness will be scattered, and angels of glory and principalities of light will bring a new heaven and a new earth.

On the night when Jesus was betrayed, he took bread, blessed it, broke the bread, and gave it to his disciples, saying: "Take, eat; this is my body which is broken for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

In the same way he took the cup of wine, and having given thanks, gave it to his disciples, saying: "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." And so,

People Remembering his eternal self-giving, we proclaim the mystery of Christ among us. Made one with him and thus one with each other, we offer these gifts, and with them ourselves, a single, holy living sacrifice.

Celebrant Bless us with your Holy Spirit, O God, and bless this bread and wine, that through them we may be made strong again with the strength that only you supply. RECEIVING COMMUNION

The Church believes that in Holy Communion, the Body and Blood of Christ is given to God's people and received by faith. All who seek God and a deeper life in Christ are welcome here and invited either to participate in Communion or to receive a blessing. To receive the bread, please hold your hands out in front of you. To receive the wine, help guide the chalice to your lips. If you prefer, you may dip the bread in the wine and then place it in your mouth. If you do not wish to receive the bread and the wine, you are invited to come forward, cross your hands across your chest, and receive a blessing. **Gluten-free communion wafers are available upon request.**

A NOTE ABOUT ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

Francis, the son of a prosperous merchant of Assisi, was born in 1182. His early youth was spent in harmless revelry and fruitless attempts to win military glory. During an imprisonment in Perugia, he had a conversion experience, and upon his release, he totally renounced all material values and took the Gospels as the rule of his life. He visited hospitals, preached in the streets, lived with animals, cared for lepers, and cleaned churches. He attracted followers, and in 1210 with a papal blessing, founded the Franciscans, which he called the Friars Minor. The order did not prosper, however, because Francis's ideal of strict and absolute poverty was found to be too difficult to maintain. In 1212 Clare of Assisi became his spiritual student and eventually started an order called the Poor Clares. On Holy Cross Day in 1224, while in meditation of Mount Alvernia, Francis received the marks of the Lord's wounds, the stigmata, which periodically bled during the remaining two years of his life. He died on October 4, 1226. Pope Gregory IX, a former patron of the Franciscans, canonized Francis in 1228.
